

The new gallery will enhance the vision the Foundation has for creating a nurturing environment for the perpetuation of the Arts and Crafts movement.

t was with a unanimous vote that the new gallery of the Sam and Alfreda Maloof Foundation for the Arts and Crafts was approved by the City of Rancho Cucamonga Planning

Commission and Historic Preservation Committee. Sam has designed the gallery to showcase the work of both regional and national craftspeople.

The structure will provide space for artist exhibitions, demonstrations, lectures and educational seminars. The gallery will contain four exhibition halls, a rotunda, and a visitor center with gift shop. There will also be a state-of-theart, temperature-controlled archival area where documents and objects from the Maloof Arts and Crafts collection will be conserved and stored. The new gallery will be the capstone to the Foundation's mission to perpetuate excellence in craftsmanship, encourage emerging artists and make available to the public the living legacy the Maloofs lovingly created.

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### Rupert Deese, Master Potter

orn in Guam in 1924, Rupert Deese received a B.A.

from Pomona College in 1950 and a M.F.A. from Claremont Graduate School in 1952. He acted as the chief designer of Wedgewood for Franciscan, Inc., while creating his own work after hours in a studio he shared with his friend, the renowned potter, Harrison McIntosh.

In 1960, Deese received the IBM Sweepstakes Prize at the 21st Ceramic National. His stoneware is represented in many private and public collections, including the Renwick Gallery at the Smithsonian Art Institute, the Walker Art Center, the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Sam Maloof owns several Deese pieces, which are on display in the Maloof historic residence.

Reflecting on the craftsmanship of his long-time friend, Sam Maloof commented: "We have collected Rummy's pottery for over 50 years. His work continues to to evolve in new dimensions . . . new shapes and glazes."


#### Become a Docent



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


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# Amoment with Sam

Sam was recently awarded the Ellis Island Medal of Honor in New York City after being nominated by Democratic Congressman Nick J. Rahall of West Virginia. The medals are presented to American citizens with immigrant roots in appreciation for their outstanding contributions to their own ethnic group, their ancestral countries and to American Society. Recipients have included former U.S. Presidents, Nobel Prize winners, leaders of industry, performers and world-class athletes.



An exhibition entitled "The Master Woodworker, Sam Maloof: One Half-century of Woodworking and Design" was held at the Millard Sheets Gallery at the Fairplex in Pomona from April 4th through May 2nd. The show featured an assortment of furniture from the Maloof's private collection, chosen to document the progression and evolution of Sam's designs from 1950 through today. Nearly 300 guests attended the opening, making it one of the most successful receptions held at the gallery, with a total gallery attendance of 2,300 during its run. The donation of one of Sam's chairs raised funds of \$28,900 to support seventeen local school groups. The winner of the chair, Dennis Ruiz, said it was a "glorious shock" to learn that he was the winner of the signature low-back walnut chair.
